Feature: Anniversaries Highlight Germany's Cultural Breadth and Depth

Germany is looking forward to an exciting 2010. Many important cultural highlights will ring in two century-old anniversaries, including Oktoberfest, Meissen porcelain and Schumann while a new kid on the block is the Ruhr area which will become the European Capital of Culture in 2010. The town of Oberammergau will put on the renowned Passion Play for the 41st time from May to October and the Gay Games will brighten Cologne's landscape in August. The Romantic Road, Germany' most traveled vacation road celebrates its 60th anniversary and last but not least, train lovers will delight in the 175th anniversary of the first German train trip from Nuremburg to Fuerth in Bavaria.

The Ruhr metropolitan area is a lively and multifaceted metropolitan area in the making. It is also opening up new ground as a tourist destination as a genuine newcomer on the European stage. As a result of its recent transformation from an industrial power house to an art&culture hotspot, the area was voted 'Europe's Cultural Capital in 2010'. The Ruhr metropolitan area is immensely proud of its huge range of different attractions in all areas of life. The Gasometer (gas tank) in Oberhausen or the museum in the Zollverein coal mine in Essen offer visitors the possibility to learn how industrial landmarks have been transformed into showplaces for art and culture. Starting in January, several celebrations featuring exhibitions in former plants and mines, events like light illuminations, concerts in old mine shaft and workshops will highlight the transformation of the Ruhr area.

Over 2,000 villagers will perform in the 2010 Play, telling the story of the life and death of Christ. All participants must either be born in Oberammergau or have lived there for at least 20 years and the play itself lasts five hours and more than 500,000 visitors from all over the world - over 100,000 from the US alone are expected. > www.oberammergau-passion.com

Since 1710, the first European porcelain manufactur has produced the world-famous Meissen porcelain (invented by Johann Friedrich Boettger on behalves of August the Strong, King of Saxony) in its traditional form. Table sets, figurines and accessories are still designed, processed and artistically decorated by hand. In 2010 (April 18 - October 1) the Meissen porcelain manufactur will celebrate 300 years of its existence. Therefore visitors can enjoy several exhibitions in Meissen and Dresden with limited editions of the world famous porcelain, along with celebratory events. > http://friedrich.meissen.com

Without any connection to Johann Friedrich Boettger in Meissen, porcelain was also successfully produced for the first time in Thuringia in 1760. Then as now, Thuringian porcelain was much sought after by collectors all over the world. Altogether 16 museums have joined to celebrate this 250th anniversary. From April to October 2010, they will be exhibiting their major collections of Thuringian porcelain. > www.thueringen-tourismus.de

In 2010 the musical world will celebrate the 200th anniversary of the birth of the great composer Robert Schumann. He was one of the most famous and important of the 19th century composers. Several events showcasing Schumann's work in original places and settings will take place in Saxony. Other cities such as Duesseldorf, Bonn, Heidelberg and Frankfurt will host also various concerts throughout the year. Highlights include the one-week Schumann Festival in Leipzig in September, the anniversary concert in the Leipziger Gewandhaus on June 3 and 4, and several concerts at the Dresdner Philharmonie and the Staatskapelle Dresden. > www.sachsen-tour.de

The world's most famous beer festival in Munich will celebrate its 200th anniversary in 2010. In October 1810 the festival took place for the first time to celebrate the marriage of Crown Prince Ludwig (later to become King Ludwig I) and Princess Therese of Saxony. This 16-day festival is held each year in Munich (September 18 - October 3, 2010) and is the world's largest fair, with some six million people attending every year.

The Romantic Road, Germany's most visited scenic route, celebrates its 60th anniversary. More than 1.3 million travel each year this 300 mile long road through Bavaria. The Romantic Road connects great attraction from medieval Rothenburg to the fairytale castle of Neuschwanstein. Rothenburg is also hosting the official launch of the 60-year anniversary celebrations on May 7 and 8, 2010, and special events and offers will attract travelers to experience the Romantic Road throughout the year.

Celebrate 175 years of German Railway and experience unforgettable railway nostalgia with theme trains from all historical periods in one of Europe's most beautiful sceneries. Center of the festivities are the cities of Nuremburg and Fuerth in Bavaria's north, which the first railway connected on its maiden voyage. During the "Blue Night" (May 15, 2010), artists will stage spectacular projections and actions to kick off the Railway Year: The past will be brought to life again with major locomotive and vehicle parades planned by German Rail and a comprehensive jubilee exhibition in the Deutsche Bahn Museum will focus on 175 years of railway history. > www.nuernberg.de

Feature: Cultural Gem in the Middle of Germany - UNESCO World Heritage City Weimar

The city of Weimar in the German state of Thuringia, about two hours southwest of Berlin, is a cultural gem and one of the places in this world with the highest density of UNESCO World Heritage Sites. Home to cultural giants from Goethe to Bach and the founding place of the Bauhaus movement, it boasts in total 13 UNESCO World Heritage buildings as well as several palaces and great gardens.

Celebrating the 90th anniversary of the Bauhaus movement this year, 34 exceptional pieces and art works from the beginning of the Bauhaus are right now on display at the Museum of Modern Arts in New York through January 25. A signature piece of the Bauhaus Movement - the red, yellow and blue wooden cradle by Peter Kehler - will be back at the Bauhaus museum in Weimar in December. The other 33 pieces of the exhibit from Weimar, which date back to the early days of the Bauhaus, will remain in New York until the end of the highly acclaimed MoMa show.

Weimar is home to original sites from the first few years of the Bauhaus: the buildings of what is now Bauhaus University, including the Gropius room, which are inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage list, along with Georg Muche's Haus am Horn, the first house that illustrated the key Bauhaus concepts. The permanent exhibition at the Bauhaus museum provides an overview of early Bauhaus work in Weimar. > www.weimar.de

Beyond Bauhaus and modernism there is much more to explore in Weimar. In fact, the city is the home of German classicism, as well as being the place where the German National Assembly passed the constitution of the Weimar Republic. Franz Liszt was the musical director in Weimar for ten years, Henry van de Velde enjoyed a highly productive period here, Bach wrote three quarters of his organ works and Luther had trusted allies in the town during the Reformation. Weimar's importance in world history can be gauged by its entries on the UNESCO World Heritage list. > www.weimar.de

However, Weimar is not a museum, but a cosmopolitan town that gives a courteous, friendly welcome to all its guests. The listed old quarter with its outstanding restaurants, cafés and pretty little shops is a must on the itinerary of any visit to Weimar, as are the parks and palaces and the houses of Goethe and Schiller and the library of Anna Amalia. The Weimar Card gives tourists access to all these sights for one and a half day for only \$15. > www.weimar.de

In 2010 Weimar will celebrate several festivals, highlights are: The Thuringian Bach Festival (March and April), Yiddish Summer Festival (July and August) and the Weimar Arts Festival (August 20 - September12). > www.weimar.de king and queen and official madness.
