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Editor's Note: Lenten Escape: Strong Beer Season

It's "Strong Beer Season" in Munich! For four weeks, especially strong, "doppelbock" beers are served during Lent after the end of Fasching. The tradition, "spring health cure," started with the monks who since time immemorial brewed an especially "nourishing" beer during Lent to strengthen the body weakened by Fasting. The story goes that when Napoleon sold the monks' brewery to a private businessman who took advantage of the "winter time blues" to produce a "doppelbock". The festival takes place from March 9th to April 1st this year. The official opening with many prominent guests takes place when the first barrel is tapped in the restaurant "Paulaner Wirtshaus" on the Nockherberg. It is also celebrated in, among other places, the "Löwenbräu Cellar", where the program includes groups in local costumes and a stone-lifting competition. * www.muenchen-tourist.de.

German Easter Markets all over Germany are wonderful way to rediscover traditions and rituals, and to prepare for the Easter holidays (see special events below). Many of the American traditions as we know them, including egg decorating, Easter trees and Easter egg games, were brought to America by German immigrants.

The origins of the German Easter traditions are not certain but some say they can be traced back to payments in kind by peasants to their lords; others say it goes back to the pagan worship of the maiden-goddess of fertility, "Eastee," or "Eastre," "Eostre" or "Ostara" and the coming of spring. The egg and rabbit were symbols of fertility and new birth to the Germanic tribes. The Germanic tribes lit bonfires to welcome Spring, and in many towns today, men in towns and cities across Germany collect wood, sometimes old Christmas trees, and create piles for Easter night's (Saturday) celebration.

Parents give their children Easter eggs - colored and boiled eggs - Easter bunnies and other sweets. The children still hunt for eggs as they did in the 1500s. Real eggs that have been blown, painted and decorated are hung from the branches of an egg-tree. An inseparable part of the holiday is the Easter meal with an Easter cake in the shape of a lamb is enjoyed after the Lenten fast. In some villages people hold an Easter walk.

Feature: Hamburg's Famous Soccer Players Leave Legacy

Hamburg is becoming known for its shopping, its world class restaurants with home-grown recipes, its five-star design hotels and hip boutiques. But hidden below the city's fashionable veneer, is a World Cup Fever that is beginning to make itself heard. All of the city is abuzz with the coming championship and its famous soccer legacy.

Hamburg, and its gleaming 50,000 seat AOL arena, will be the venue for five matches during the 2006 World Cup, including the first phase matches involving Argentina and Italy and one of the quarter finals. Hamburg boasts not only that it will be home to the U.S. Soccer team for the World Cup this year, but also is proud of its outstanding roster of soccer players, including Franz Beckenbauer, Uwe Seeler and the Englishman, Kevin Keegan.

Franz Beckenbauer, a.k.a, the "Kaiser," and now Germany's President of the World Cup Organizing Committee, played two years for Hamburg from 1980 to 1982. This was just after his stint with the New York Cosmos where he played along side Brazilian soccer star, Pele. Beckenbauer was captain of the German team in 1974 when it won the World Cup in Munich after a successful penalty kick by Gerd Mueller. And, Beckenbauer was coach of the German team when they won the World Cup in 1990.

Then there is the famous Uwe Seeler who is said to hold the Hamburger's affection like no other player. In 1961, Seeler turned down a fantastically lucrative offer to play for Inter Milan and decided to stick with his Hamburg team, a club he loved. All in all, Seeler played 72 times for his country and scored 43 goals and put in four appearances at the World Cup. In fact, he shares a record with Pele in that he actually scored in all the World Cup games. Seeler is now a living legend in Hamburg and the city's official ambassador to the World Cup.

Easter Egg Market in Hameln, Lower Saxony

Regional Focus: The Sorbs and Easter

In eastern Germany near the border with Poland, the Sorbs, a Slavic minority that has lived for generations in this area, celebrate Easter with a parade called the "Kreuztritt" (Cross Walk). The men of the village dressed in traditional costumes of black jackets and top hats, ride horses in a circle form from town to town announcing the resurrection of Christ. The Sorb's Easter celebration can be seen in every town in this area called Lusatia.

But it is not only Easter; the Sorbs practice a great variety of customs and traditions that differ slightly from village to village. Most of the customs practiced throughout the year originate from pre-Christian times. While you are visiting Sorbs areas you may encounter women dressed in the traditional Sorbian wear. Especially on the weekends you will see young women and many children in festive dresses portraying and preserving old Sorbian customs.
